FROM THE PEN OF THE PARISH PRIEST



Any of us are finding the separation from one another during this lockdown Being separated from family and difficult. friends, as well as having our usual freedoms understandably curtailed, has proven to be a challenge most of us have never had to imagine - though the first disciples would have had some sympathy for our plights, as they huddled themselves together in a locked room out of fear they would go the way of lesus. This fear began to be transformed with Jesus' appearance to his friends.

The Gospels of Easter show us moments when lesus appears to his followers. There is some

thing different about him, like when he appears to Mary Magdalene at the empty tomb, or when he appears to followers as on the road to Emmaus, or when he appears on a seashore telling his friends to cast their nets on the other side.

He is the Jesus they knew. And yet with his Resurrection he has somehow become more real, and their eyes and hearts need time to adjust to a new way of looking at their friends. Just think about that first time when Jesus appeared to his friends when they had locked themselves away, offering them only peace and forgiveness: one week later and they were still locked away.

They were not transformed overnight because it takes a while to cast out fear. It takes time for human hearts to accept truths greater than they can possibly imagine - even if the disciples had eyes and hands telling them this truth was reality.

The good news of Easter is that the cycles of this world will end. Very often it feels like our lives are stuck in a cycle, and that this cycle eventually gives way to death. But the joy of Easter is that death will itself give way to life.
